Fairness definition

All rowers shall compete fairly, showing respect for their opponents and for the regatta officials. In particular,

- be at the start on time
- follow instructions of the officials at all times, both on and off the water.
- Officials shall
 - ensure Rules of Racing applied fairly
- atmosphere of respect to all competitors.

VLC Sprints

- ID files will be used for random checking of crews
 - If no ID file, selected crews will be relegated to last place
- Athlete weighing
 - Lightweight rowers and coxswains for Senior A events
- Heats with progression dependent on times
 - Aligner keep backup time (pilot also if possible)
- Rope hold starts
- Water rules

Radio Protocol

- Use only when necessary
- Listen before you speak Wait until previous call has ended
- Press the PTT button and wait half a second before speaking
- Identify who you are calling then identify yourself
 - Call: President of the Jury, Umpire Michael
 - Reply: PoJ Go or PoJ Send
- Keep it short and simple speak slowly and precisely avoid getting exited - you become unintelligible
- Stay off the air during emergencies
- Switch off radio before putting it back in crate

Examples

- Pilot calls in race:
 - Stand by for the start of Race number 10,
 - Junior men's U19 eight, Final A,
 - Umpire 4 Michael,
 - Changing to channel 2/3
- On Channel 2/3
 - Race number 10, Umpire 4 Michael
 - Hold radio open for Attention and Go
 - Change radio back to channel 1
- Notify finish if any warnings, DNS, DNF



Radio Protocol – DON'Ts

- Critique officials over the radio
- Don't engage in unnecessary chatter
- Don't put flat batteries in battery bags



Radio Protocol - Tips

- Channel 1 and 3 old Kenwood radios
- Channels 1 and 2 on new Motorola radios
- Shield MIC when there is wind
- Check that antenna is screwed in properly
- On new radios, light indicates someone is talking
- When updating entries, break it up into small sections
- Be careful what you say on the radio anyone could be within earshot of a radio



Safety

• Priority 1 means a life is in potential danger

- Capsized and heads not all visible
- All racing must stop, rescue responds at maximum speed
- Radio is used for safety only, until cleared by Safety Officer
- Priority 2 means a need of possible emergency care
 - Serious but not life threatening
 - Racing continues, do not start any races until all clear
 - Rescue goes at speed taking care as racing is still going on
 - Essential radio comms, until cleared by Safety Officer
- **Priority 3** means no health or life threatening situation
 - Capsized, but heads are all above water
 - Rescue goes as fast as possible without washing competitors

Changes to Rules of Racing 2014

- Rule changes are considered by SAROC each year and submitted to the RowSAAGM for ratification
- Proposed changes to these rules can be submitted to the chair of SAROC by constituent members for consideration



Red Card

- Two Warnings (yellow cards) indicates an Exclusion (red card)
 - Applies to current race
 - Warnings from previous heats, reps, semis do not apply
 - Exclusion is for this event
 - May enter other events



Bow number

- Must be rigid and fitted vertically
- White or yellow
- Black lettering of 150 mm
- No alteration of the number is allowed



Rowers age categories

- JW18 and JM18 are junior rowers competing in provincial or international events and may do so until 31st December of the year in which they reach the age of 18.
- For SA, Boys and Girls U13, U14, U15, U16 and U19
 - The rower is classified as Uxx until the 31st of December of the year in which they reach the age of xx
- A rower or coxswain may participate as an Under 23 rower until 31 December of the year in which they reach the age of 22

Undershirts and leggings

- If undershirts and / or leggings are worn by any members of a crew then:
 - Those worn by those crew members shall be uniform (as per hats/caps)
 - They shall be neutral in colour or matching the registered racing uniform
 - They must be devoid of logos, advertising or other markings

Starting the race

- Call Attention
- Raise the Red Flag
- After a variable pause of **1 to 5 seconds** ...
- The race is started by the umpire dropping a red flag
- This must be a definite movement
- Accompanied with the word Go

Start zone (100m)

- If an interference or clash occurs within the first 100m
 - The umpire **may** stop the race and
 - May issue a warning / yellow card to any offending crew
- No breakage zone
 - (unless in local rules such as at Boat Race)

Masters handicap system

- Example has been corrected
- Winners time dictates the row in the table
- Time per age category is subtracted from each boat
- Age category is at 1st January of season
- Equal or greater than age category A to K
- Mixed gender crews add to women's ages:
 - Age 27 to 35 add 15 years
 - Age 36 to 49 add 12 years
 - Age 50 and older add 10 years
