Penalties

- Reprimand
- Warning (yellow card)
 - Will still apply if race is re-rowed
 - Violation of traffic rules, late at start, dress code
- Exclusion (red card) removed from event
 - Late at start, two yellow cards, clashes during race
- Disqualification removal of crew from all events
 - Flagrant or intentional violation of rules
 - False declaration of name, classification or club membership
- Relegation to last place
 - Underweight boat


Red Card

- Two Warnings (yellow cards) indicates an Exclusion (red card)
 - Applies to current race
 - Warnings from previous heats, reps, semis do not apply
 - Exclusion is for this event
 - May enter other events



Who can award a penalty?

- Any umpire can recommend a penalty
- Penalties are awarded by
 - Umpire of the race for all other offences
 - Aligner/Judge at the Start can only stop race for a False Start
 - Jury when a protest is heard



Control commission - Boats

- Bow number is too small (150 mm) or wrong colours
- Bow ball
 - Is not white
 - Broken
 - Missing
- Heel straps
 - Too long should be about 70 mm
 - Missing
- Bung cover missing, taped over
- Boat underweight, repeat offence



Control commission - Athletes

Athlete weighing

- Late
- Did not weigh in
- Cox does not have ballast at end of race
- Lightweight crew overweight
- ID book has not been presented
- Crew changes not communicated
 - Random checking of athletes
 - Objection by another crew



At regatta

- Bad behavior
 - Unsportsmanlike conduct or behaviour
 - Use of obscene language or gestures
 - Abusive behavior towards officials, competitors, spectators
 - Malicious damage to property
- Not complying with instructions from any official

On water

- Bow number
 - Missing
 - Wrong number
 - Too small or wrong colours
- Traffic violation
 - Following wrong route
 - Crossing course in wrong place
 - Practicing starts in wrong place



At start

- Late at the start
 - 2 minute rule
 - Holds for boats or athletes
 - Catching up time
- Dress code
 - Racing uniform
 - Caps
 - Undershirts or leggings
- False start
 - More than one crew false starts?

During a race

- Breakage
 - Before the race
 - In start zone
 - Forcing a clash to restart due to a breakage
- Clashes in race
 - Start zone
 - Elsewhere on the course
 - Going off the course
- Electronic receiving or sending of data



Objection at end of race

- Has the crew been disadvantaged?
 - No -> regular race
- Has the disadvantage affected the ranking of the obstructed crew?
 - No -> confirm the result
- Exclude the offending crew Does this exclusion restore chances of obstructed crew?
 - Yes -> confirm the result
- Re-row those crews whose ranking has been affected



- What is done if results in finals are:
 - GBR CAN SUI FRA
 - CAN GBR SUI FRA
 - SUI GBR CAN FRA
 - SUI FRA GBR CAN

Heads races

Heads race

Head race means a race where the order of finish is determined by comparison of elapsed times taken to cover the prescribed course



- Boats race one after the other
- The times are taken at start and finish
- Winners are crews with shortest times

The Head of the Charles



Head of the Charles 2014

- 50th event, started in 1965
- 11,000 athletes from 776 clubs and 400,000 spectators
- 4800 metres, 6 bridges
- 31 events with 1244 crews on Saturday
- 30 events with 1088 crews on Sunday
- 15 second intervals
- 4 events with 85 boats
 - 29 minutes till next event

- Universities
- Schools
- Men 6.2km
- Women 4 km




Heads race

- Start rowing before start line Countdown, Start rowing
- Start time when boat crosses start line Go
- Time calculated between finish and start
- Crews are seeded to minimize overtaking
- Static umpiring along course
- Backup watches at both ends
- Video of start and finish if possible
- Marshalling is most important

Heads races at Roodeplaat

- Large single sculls entry for championships
- Rock the Boat regattas
- 20 second intervals using 2 lanes
- KES and St Dunstan's regattas



Lessons at Roodeplaat

- Athletes not at start of time
- Getting crews into order
- Marshalling
- Gap between events
